Simon James Macqueen MBE

Newly appointed Chair of Watford FC's Sport and Community Trust and Sport England director of strategy, Simon has been made a Member of the Order of the British Empire (MBE) for services to sport.

A former Sarratt Football Club player and Chairman, the 49-year-old has been "hugely important" to the growth of youth football at Sarratt Football Club and



worked "at significant personal cost" during the pandemic - 7 days a week for many months - to lead the creation of the government's £600m Sport Survival Package.

Simon also raised more than £150,000 in two years for Alice's Arc, a charity established to fund research into the rare form of cancer that claimed the life of his daughter.

"I'm extremely honoured to have received this award," he said, thanking his work colleagues, family, fellow trustees and the Sarratt Rebels coaching team. "Their support over the years has been incredible and, without which, I would not be receiving this award."

Congratulations to Barbara Bivens

It's not long ago that I was writing in these pages about a prestigious award by the FA to John Bivens of The Green, Sarratt, recognising his enduring service to football, but now it's Barbara's turn!

Barbara joined the Middlesex FA 25 years ago. She has served the County in almost every capacity from the Competition Committee to Disciplinary Chairman whilst continuing to work with John at North Greenford United FC. In both roles her energy, organisation and sheer commitment to grass roots football have created an extraordinary legacy, which has now been recognised by her election to the prestigious role of President of the Middlesex FA.

Barbara is the first woman to be elected to the position and she is committed to using her experience to enhance all grassroots football in the County. Her appointment coincides with rapid developments in the women's game and the role of women in football. I know that she will support and develop this important work.

Edith Helen Hall (née Thomas) 12th August 1934 – 30th December 2024

Helen was born in Swansea in 1934. One of five children, she was academically gifted and went on to be appointed Head Girl at her High School. In 1962, she moved to London to study medicine at University College Hospital, after which posts in Swansea and at the John Radcliffe Hospital in Oxford followed. After specialising in anaesthetics, Helen spent 4 years in Cape Town working with Dr Christiaan Barnard, the



pioneering heart transplant surgeon. Before retirement, she was working as a consultant at Edgware Hospital.

Helen married Robert (Bob), also an anaesthetist, in 1974. After initially living in Oxhey, they purchased "Chevins" on The Green in 1998 and, after extensive work on the property, moved in the following year.

Helen had an active retirement: she volunteered with Victim Support and also helped organise meals on wheels in the village. She enjoyed the arts, in particular water-colour painting, sculpture and playing the piano. She was a member of Chorleywood Golf Club, played bridge, and was a regular attendee at a local book group.

In order to have more support Helen moved to Chorleywood Manor care home in 2022, where she continued to play bridge and joined the play-reading group. She passed away peacefully at the Rennie Peace Hospice in Watford.

Helen was a hugely supportive and generous aunt and great-aunt to her many nieces and nephews and their families. She will be very much missed by us all.

'200 Years of the National Gallery'

In 1824, Lord Liverpool's Government bought 38 paintings for £57,000 from the heirs of philanthropist John Julius Augerstein, beginning the embryonic national collection then displayed in Augerstein's Pall Mall townhouse. By 1832, it was clear that a purposebuilt gallery was necessary and the new National Gallery, designed by William Wilkins, opened on Trafalgar Square in 1838.

Suffragette sabotage, bombs and theft all featured in the gallery's early years. This fully illustrated lecture will explore these stories and give a closer look at the majestic, peerless art works, including some of the original '38'.

Simon Whitelaw is an actor, lecturer, presenter, voice coach and a London Blue Badge Guide, who has worked in-house at Shakespeare's Globe, the BBC and the National Gallery. Everyone is welcome – please join us.

Visitors to Holy Cross Church 2024

I have always been interested as to where the visitors to Holy Cross come from and what they think of our church, so here is what I found from the entries for 2024 in the visitors' book.

There were 99 entries but with 131 names entered and it seems that 40% of visitors lived within a 20 mile radius of Sarratt with most of these within just 10 miles and nearly a further 20% were from the Greater London area. This is not surprising as it is such a popular area for walkers, cyclists and motorists alike. Others were from further away: 3 from Wiltshire, 2 each from Bedfordshire and Norfolk and just one visitor from Cambridgeshire and Essex. Then there are the overseas visitors from 12 countries: Australia led the field with 9, USA with 5, France 4, New Zealand 2 and one each from Brazil, Hungary, India, Italy, Philippines, Portugal, South Africa and Ukraine.

The comments left by visitors are interesting too! A great many talked about the peace and serenity that they found in such an historic place of worship, they thanked us for having the church open, for the information available and for providing somewhere for a quiet prayer or to light a candle in memory of a loved one. Others were revisiting the church where they had been married many years before, or visiting the graves of loved ones. One Australian lady was amazed to see where her mother had been baptised and her grandparents married and a USA family came because three generations of their ancestors were buried here.

Parish Council Report

Sarah Dobson



The following report covers the key points arising from the SPC Meeting held on Tuesday 14 January.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

The 80th Anniversary of Victory in Europe (VE) Day falls on 8 May 2025. The Government has announced this should be marked with a national 'Shared Moment of Celebration' (rather than commemoration). However, 8 May will not be a public / bank holiday. SPC would therefore like to propose an evening event on Sarratt Green and has approached several organisation in the Village to help arrange something – see notice earlier in Spotlight for more details and how to get involved.

PLANNING

Neighbourhood Plan:

There has been another delay in this process as TRDC issued an old version of the plan for the District Consultation over Summer 2024. It appears TRDC also passed the old version to the Examiner for her latest review of the plan. It is more than likely the District Consultation will therefore have to be re-run with the correct version. TRDC have assured us the latest version will go out for consultation as soon as possible. It is hoped it will still be possible to present the plan for a Parish Referendum at the same time as the local elections in May.

Royal British Legion Outline Planning Application, 24/1833/OUT:

SPC has submitted comments to TRDC on the above application to build 18 new dwellings on the site, of which 8 will be affordable. Further details and SPC's comments can be viewed on the TRDC website www.threerivers.gov.uk by clicking through to the planning section and entering the reference number above in the search field.

Review of current Planning Applications:

24/2069/PDE & 24/2070/PDE & 24/2071/PDE: Doggetts,
 Penman's Hill, Belsize, WD4 9DJ - Prior Approval: Single storey rear extension (depth 8.00 metres, maximum height 3.85 metres, maximum eaves height 3.35 metres)

SPC: Noted. We understand this property is locally listed, so we request that checks are made that these proposals do not impact that status. [Same response for each of these 3 applications]

24/2047/FUL: Tarn, Dunny Lane, Belsize, WD4 9DQ - <u>Erection of a part single</u>, part two storey rear extension; raising of ridge height; front and rear dormers and front roof lights; alterations to fenestration and internal alterations.

SPC: No objection on the basis this extension is less footprint than permitted development options and due to the existing plot size there is no impact on the neighbouring properties.

24/2008/FUL: Corner House, Redhall Lane, Chandlers Cross,
 WD3 4LX - Variation of Condition 2 (Plans) pursuant to planning
 permission 23/1192/FUL to allow the raising of ridge height, addition
 of two rear dormers; installation of rooflights to flat roof and side
 elevation, alterations to fenestration detail.

SPC: No objection to this variation on the basis that it will have very minimal external effect and will increase the use of insulation.

- 24/1919/PDT: The Laurels, White Shack Lane, Chandlers Cross, WD3 4ND Prior approval: Enlargement of the dwellinghouse by the construction of one additional storey (4.77m height) and raising of ridge to result in an overall height of 7.95m (Class AA)
 SPC: Noted. We assume checks will be made to ensure that neighbouring properties are not unduly impacted by this application.
- 24/1981/FUL: Dellfield House, Plough Lane, Sarratt, WD3 4NL Demolition of existing conservatory, erection of a two storey side
 extension including accommodation in the roof space served by
 rooflights and internal alterations

 SPC: No objection on the basis this application will result in minimal.

SPC: No objection on the basis this application will result in minimal footprint change, not impact any neighbouring properties and will significantly improve energy efficiency.

• 24/1975/FUL: Langdale, Bucks Hill, WD4 9AT - <u>Erection of a single storey side and rear extension; erection of a single storey front extension; internal alterations.</u>

SPC: No objection on the basis that this application appears to be smaller and will have less impact to neighbouring properties than the previously approved application.

- 24/1964/CLPD: Sandfield, Dawes Lane, Sarratt, WD3 6BQ <u>Certificate of Lawfulness Proposed Development: Demolition of existing conservatory and side projection; construction of a single storey side and rear extension; and alterations to fenestration.</u>
 SPC: No objection
- 24/1950/FUL: Cottage Farm, Redhall Lane, Chandlers Cross, WD3 4LT - <u>Demolition of existing buildings and construction of four dwellings including terraces with associated landscaping and parking provision.</u>

SPC: We welcome the intention to redevelop the underutilised and deteriorating existing buildings and the aim to bring biodiversity net gain to this site. As the site is in Green Belt, exceptional circumstances are needed to override policies to allow building of new dwellings. Unfortunately, we do not believe that 4 bedroom houses match the local needs and as such do not qualify as exceptional circumstances. We would like to also note that it is understood that most of the current vehicle traffic enters the neighbouring site, so the result of this application may lead to an increase in vehicle traffic on the application site.

• 24/1995/PDF: The Mulberry Bush, Moor Lane, Sarratt - Prior Notification: Change of use of 3no. agricultural building to flexible commercial use Class C1 (hotels)

SPC: Noted. We also note that the Herts Highways response incorrectly includes the Dawes Lane entrance as access. The Dawes Lane entrance by formal agreement is for agricultural use only, so will not apply for the leisure use referenced in this application.

SPC: Noted TRDC: Approved

- 24/1684/FUL: Paddock Cottage, Old House Lane, Kings Langley, WD4 9AA Construction of a single storey outbuilding. SPC: (Neutral) Although plans appear to be appropriate to the location, we have general concerns about any new building in a Green Belt area. If officers are minded to approve we ask that restrictions are added to ensure the building remains ancillary to the main dwelling and permitted development rights are removed. TRDC: Approved (ancillary restriction added)
- 24/1527/FUL: The Old Gate, Bucks Hill, WD4 9BR Installation of flood lighting and external lighting of menage and stable area SPC: We object to this application on the basis of the information provided, and other inputs, that it will provide unacceptable level of light pollution to the neighbouring properties. There are alternative lighting solutions for this type of application that can be installed closer to the ground that will achieve the desired usage without impacting the neighbouring properties.

Planning Appeals

ENVIRONMENT

- SPC approved funding of £6,200 from reserves for the removal of an Ash tree that needs attention immediately. Funding has been earmarked in the SPC budget for 2025/26 commencing in April to start execution of the works deemed necessary by the 10-year Woodland Management Plan. SPC are currently seeking anyone who would be interested in supporting the Council to project manage implementation of the plan. This would be on a part time basis a couple of hours a week at most. If interested, please get in touch with the Parish Clerk.
- SPC is in the process of gathering quotations for the remedial work to the Cricketer's Pond to clear the sweetgrass and excess lilies and reeds.
- The sycamore by Springfield and opposite Moor Lane that is currently cordoned off for safety reasons is due to be felled by UK Power contractors in January.
- Greg Edmund from the Sarratt Local History Society was given permission by the Council to again metal detect the north end of Sarratt Green following the Boxing Day Car Festival. He made a number of significant finds and will be compiling a report for SPC and the History Society.

POLICY & RESOURCES

Payments made since the last meeting were approved, and Cllr Lowry advised spending was on track to come in on budget at the end of the financial year on 31 March.

SPC has submitted its budget (Precept) request to TRDC - £111,045, equating to a 2.5% increase on the current year. SPC was subsequently notified by TRDC that the number of households in Sarratt Parish, which is used to calculate the amount of Council Tax payable by each Band D equivalent household, has fallen by 8 houses. As a result, the Council Tax payable by each Band D equivalent household in the Parish for SPC's services in 2025/26 will increase by 68p, bringing the annual figure to £101.08.

The following policies were reviewed as part of the Council's 2-year policy review cycle: Code of Conduct, and its procedures for dealing with Complaints, Grievances and Unreasonably Persistent or Vexatious Complaints. The January 2025 versions of these policies can be found on the SPC website.

HIGHWAYS

The Clerk and Jackie Creed (Sarratt Care) are looking to establish a 'Shopper Bus' Service for Sarratt. It is planned to run on Tuesdays and Thursdays with home pick-ups to Rickmansworth for the cost of £3. It will potentially also be available for group trips on Wednesdays. The Clerk is also trying to set up a line of communication with Red Eagle buses and Herts Highways in order to be advised when the regular bus service is delayed or diverted due to roadworks / road closures so parishioners can be informed.

The Clerk, together with representatives from the other Parish Councils in Three Rivers attended a meeting at the District Council Offices with the Herts Police Chief Inspector Andrew Palfreyman. The Clerk reported that the meeting had been very worthwhile, and that she had been able to communicate the individual demands of Sarratt Parish in Policing terms.

State of the Roads

Severe weather has exposed the poor condition of our roads; a diversion, following the sewage leakage in Dimmocks Lane, was via Bottom Lane, which was completely flooded!

SPC has written to HCC Highways and our County and District Councillors, requesting a meeting to strategically address the highways problems being faced in Sarratt with a view to agreeing a plan of action. An acknowledgement has been received from County Councillors' Roberts and Williams and from the office of Gagan Mohindra MP. Cllr Williams is tasked with helping to organise the meeting with Herts Highways' officials.

Parishioners are requested to continue to report faults to https://www.hertfordshire.gov.uk/services/highways-roads-and-pavements/report-a-problem/report-a-highway-fault/what-type-of-fault-are-you-reporting.aspx or via the Parish Office.

Sewage Leak Dimmocks Lane.

A severe sewage leak, affecting many properties, occurred just after the New Year. Thames Water were very slow to respond but eventually resolved the blockage. Outstanding immediate issues include the clean-up and compensation for householders affected. Longer-term, it would be good to know if this is a bigger problem within the village and, looking ahead, how the system will cope potentially an extra 100 houses going forward. It is understood there is not a specific record of sewage leaks, but residents may be able to advise and should notify the Clerk if they have any relevant information they can pass on.

OTHER MATTERS

KGV Playground

Cllr Alder was able to report that Caloo had applied a new surface to the basketball area of the playground. Cllr Alder will confirm that the work is satisfactory and that the job can be closed.

Sarratt Fair

The organisers of the Sarratt Fair have advised they would like to book a date in July. SPC noted the date in July last year was unsatisfactory as it came after the schools had broken up for summer, with many families already away. SPC will notify the Fair organisers they would rather the Fair to be reinstated in May. It had previously been moved to July due to COVID, and last year due to a clash with the Coronation Day celebrations.

Emergency Response

The Village Hall Committee have agreed the hall can be used as an evacuation centre in the event of a major disaster in the district which results in people having to evacuate their homes. Training sessions are taking place in January and February.
